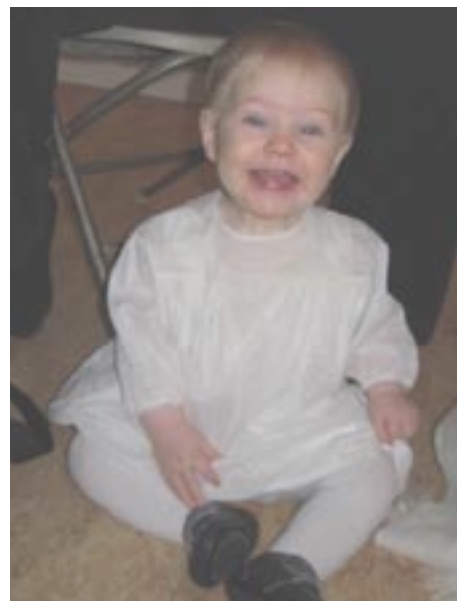
Spring Gathering

January in Ithaca Monthly Meeting History

10 Years Ago (Jan. 13, 2002)

As part of the Annual Meeting, the Clerkship of IMM was transferred from Dick Crepeau to Beth Jolles. Twenty-nine persons heard annual reports of committees and approved an amended State of the Meeting report.

15 Years Ago (Jan. 9, 1997)

Jan Philpot transferred her membership from Newark, Delaware to IMM.

20 Years Ago (Jan. 13, 1992)

Steve Mohlke presented a description of the work he and Bronwyn were to be undertaking soon with the Heifer Project in Mexico. Because they would receive no salary, several organizations were being asked to sponsor their work. IMM agreed to a commitment of raising three month's support.

30 Years Ago (Jan. 11, 1982)

Nominating Committee presented an updated report and indicated that Frank Pineo had agreed to become Clerk.

45 Years Ago (Jan. 9, 1967)

Notice of the weekly anti-Vietnam War vigil and of the Meeting were sent to the local newspaper and radio station. A Selective Service Counseling Committee [including IMM members] was set up in the parish house of the Unitarian Church.

60 Years Ago (Jan. 14, 1962)

Edith Edgerton and Jean Klune reported that Women's International League for Peace and Freedom and AFSC recordings against Universal Military Training (UMT) were ruled to be political and could not be broadcast over local radio free of charge. IMM appropriated up to \$20 to have these recordings aired at appropriate times. Ed Cranch and Sam Lindley were chosen as a committee to write letters to the Ithaca Journal and New York Times on UMT.

80 Years Ago (Jan. 10, 1932)

In a brief Business Meeting, Joshua Cope, who was soon to take a Sabbatical leave to Europe, tendered his resignation as Clerk. Alfred Wray was appointed as his successor.

What Are You Reading?

I received a copy of *The Four Agreements* by Don Miguel Ruiz for Christmas. This book outlines four simple agreements that you make with yourself (and with the universe) that help a person live more spiritually and more fully. The idea is to separate from the negativity that we have absorbed, both in the messages we have absorbed and internalized, and in our way of being and doing. The book is short and easy to read.

From *The Four Agreements*:

"The First Agreement is be impeccable with your word. Speak with integrity. Say only what you mean. Avoid using the word to speak against yourself or to gossip about others. Use the power of your word in the direction of truth and love....Now let us see what the word impeccability means. Impeccability means 'without sin.' Impeccable comes from the Latin *pecatus*, which means "sin." The *im* in Impeccable means 'without', so impeccable means 'without sin.'"

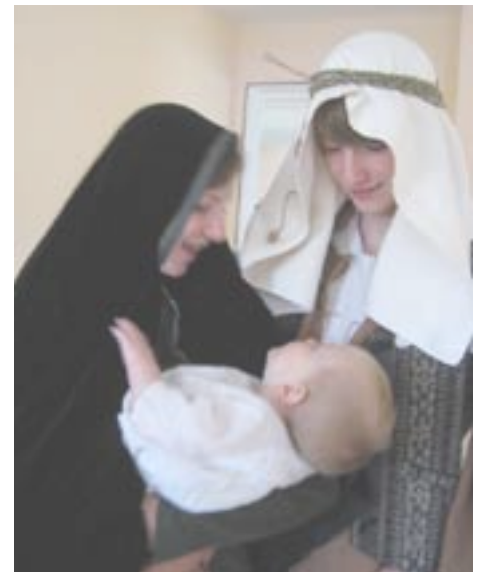

Ithaca Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends
Monthly Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business, December 11, 2011

2011-12.1 Gathering

Ithaca Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends met in Worship with Attention to Business on December 11, 2012. At 12:25 PM, 14 Friends settled into open worship. Clerk then reviewed the agenda of the day's business, and noted that Ellie Rosenberg and Tonia Saxon would be holding the Meeting in the Light. Clerk offered a reading from Stanley Hauerwas on Silence: as a way for God's people to be present; a way "not to let the darkness overwhelm us". After some further silent worship, we turned our attention to the day's business.

2011-12.2 Peace Witness Committee

Marjorie Baines presented the Committee's proposals for donating the rest of the budgeted funds (discretionary and pre-approved) under their care: \$120 each to Alternatives to Violence Project (AVP) International; Friends' International Center in Ramallah, Palestine; two initiatives of the Friends' Peace Teams: the Great Lakes Initiative (East-Central Africa) and the Indonesia Initiative; Nonviolent Peaceforce; ProNica; and Ramallah Friends' School, for a total of \$840. Meeting APPROVED these donations. Peace Witness can provide information on these organizations to anyone interested in more detail. @

2011-12.3 Third Street Meetinghouse Committee (TSMC)

Larry Clarkberg brought the TSMC's proposals for two more elements of the Building Use Policy: a fee structure, and a decision-making process by which groups will or will not be approved to use the facility. The committee has been laboring to achieve a balance between use of the house for IMM's own programs and for building relationships in the larger community. Meeting APPROVED the fee structure and the decision-making process. These policies will be available to the public on the IMM website. @

2011-12.4 Nominating Committee

Nancy Gabriel presented the committee's nominations for IMM committee appointments for 2012. Some corrections were indicated, and the list included some unfilled positions which will be addressed in future business meetings. There are changes in several committees, and members of some committees still need to de-

cide how to stagger their terms to provide smooth rotations. With amendments included, Meeting APPROVED the list of nominees. @

2011-12.5 Finance Committee

1. Copies of the proposed budget for 2012 were distributed. Dick Crepeau and Mike Simkin reported on some changes from the draft budget which had been proposed in November, with clarifications as needed in response to Friends' questions.
2. We then turned our attention to issues still unresolved in the draft budget which was presented today. After discussion, Meeting APPROVED the 2012 budget with these adjustments: rental income for the Burt House was reduced to reflect the experience of the past few years; the amount to be set aside for repairs was increased due to updated valuations of the properties; and the amount to be donated to NYYM was increased by \$1,000.
3. Having reviewed our overall financial condition, the committee expects to be able to pay back \$60,000 (i.e. half) of the \$120,000 borrowed this year for the Third Street Meetinghouse. @

2011-12.6 Treasurer

The monthly financial report and a report specific to the Third Street Meetinghouse were distributed and are available from the Treasurer. @

2011-12.7 Other Concerns

A Friend expressed ongoing difficulty in following all the detail during reporting from Finance Committee and the Treasurer at the same meeting, and asked whether another way of reporting might be explored. The concern was referred to the Finance Committee. @

At 2:55 PM, 13 Friends settled into worship before adjourning the Meeting. We will gather again for Annual Meeting, and for Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business, on January 8, 2012.

Advices & Queries from NYYM Faith & Practice

Advice 7. Friends are advised to work toward removing the causes of misery and suffering. They are urged to support efforts to overcome racial, social, economic, and educational discrimination; to bear testimony against all forms of oppression; to exert influence for such treatment of prisoners as may help reconstruct their lives; and to work for the abolition of the death penalty.

Query 4. Are love and unity fostered among us? If differences arise, do we endeavor to reconcile them in a spirit of love and truth? Are we careful not to manipulate and exploit one another? Do we avoid talebearing, and are we careful of the reputation of others?
