Come any time between 9am and 9pm on this Thursday and Friday. Bring your non-toxic cleaning supplies, buckets, rags, and a joyful spirit.

While the contractors have been working, tables, chairs, and other furnishings have been waiting for us in the Barrys' barn and the Jolles' barn. On April 2nd beginning at 9:00 am, we will bring our things downtown and arrange them in our new space.

Please consider spending all or parts of these days rolling up your sleeves and helping Friends take the first steps toward getting our new home ready.

Beginning on Sunday, April 10th, Meeting for Worship each first day will begin at 10:30am.

### 24-hour Meeting for Worship

Plans are proceeding for a 24-hour Meeting for Worship to begin Saturday, April 9th at 11:30am.

### Hospice Foundation of America's 18th Annual Living with Grief Program: Spirituality and End-of-Life Care

Spirituality and End-of-Life Care is the Hospice Foundation of America's annual teleconference which is geared toward anyone with an interest in helping others deal with life-limiting illness, dying, death, grief or bereavement. It will be held Thursday, April 28, from 1 to 4:30p in the Tompkins County Public Library, Borg Warner Room.

The program begins with participants watching a national teleconference which features a panel of clergy and medical professionals discussing the relationship and differences between spirituality and religion, as well as spirituality during illness, death and grief, spiritual assessment and empowerment, and life review. Hospicare is hosting the program and will facilitate a local panel discussion with Jeff Collins, Social Worker at Hospicare, Reverend Meredith Ellis, Chaplain at Cayuga Medical Center, and Rabbi Scott Glass, Rabbi at Temple Beth-El. It is co-sponsored by Cayuga Medical Center Spiritual Care Department and Area Congregations Together (ACT).

There is no fee to attend this program unless participants wish to receive continuing education (CE) credits and/or to purchase the companion book. 
## "Servas" program for youth travel abroad

**Minutes of the March 13, 2011 Monthly Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business  
Ithaca Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends**

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201102.1 Gathering

Ithaca Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society Friends met in the Café at Anabel Taylor Hall on March 13, 2011. At 12:55 PM, 23 Friends settled into open worship. Clerk reviewed the agenda of the day's business, and extended our appreciation to Elspeth Rhodin and Ellie Rosenberg for holding the Meeting in the Light. Clerk read two Queries from NYYM: Do we make opportunity in our daily lives for conversation with God and the opening of our hearts to the Christ within? Are we thankful for each day as an opportunity for a new adventure of life with God? A period of open worship followed this reading.

201103.2 Ministry and Worship (M&W)

Tonia Saxon, Assistant Clerk, brought several committee matters.

- A. Tonia read a report on the 24-hour Meeting for Worship which is planned for the day before, overnight, and into the morning of our first Meeting at the new meetinghouse. We anticipate and hope that the dates will be April 9-10, 2011, provided we have received the Certificate of Occupancy from the City of Ithaca. Friends received the report.
- B. Tonia reported on two Committees for Clearness for Membership. The recommendation for membership for Sandra Steingraber was APPROVED. The recommendation for membership for Jeff de Castro was APPROVED.
- C. Marin Clarkberg gave us details on the outcome of the survey that M&W conducted within IMM about preferred times for Meeting for Worship on First Days. The committee is not yet prepared to make a recommendation about summer worship at Hector MH, but does feel ready to propose that, starting with our move into the new meetinghouse, Meeting for Worship will begin at 10:30 AM all year round. Clerk and the committee invited comment. Concerns were expressed that there be ample time for discussion and religious education, and that worship time be considered within the flow of the whole First Day. With the understanding that the decision can be revisited if we are so led, Friends APPROVED the change to starting Meeting for Worship at 10:30 AM in the new meetinghouse.
- D. Tonia Saxon read a statement from M&W regarding the range of opinions and feelings they have heard about options for summer worship at Hector MH. The committee welcomes input as Friends continue to consider the questions, and there will be an opportunity in the near future to meet together to talk about the matter. Friends accepted the report.
- E. Tonia read the proposed State of the Meeting report, which includes a review of events in the Meeting during 2010 and a summary of our discussion of the Queries sent by NYYM. Friends present suggested some substantive changes, and entrusted to Tonia and M&W the final wording of the changes. With this, the State of the Meeting report was APPROVED to be sent on to our Regional and Yearly Meetings. @

201103.3 Project Management Committee

Lynn Truame read the report updating us on progress made and decisions to come in the renovation. Friends received the report. @

201103.4 Trustees

Marilyn Ray reported that IMM's application for full tax-exempt status for the new Meetinghouse has been approved. Friends received the report. @

201103.5 Clerk's Business

Steve Mohlke reported that the question of the name(s) used for the new meetinghouse, discussed briefly last month, has not been addressed. There are other new and already-mentioned issues for which it seems advisable that the Meeting hold some focused discussion meetings. Dates were proposed and discussed, and final dates for these meetings will be published very soon. @

201103.6 Treasurer's Report

Mike Simkin, Treasurer, gave the monthly report, highlighting some details about cash flow during the final stages of renovation which is going about as had been anticipated. Both pledges received and contributions to the general fund are ahead of the schedule we had expected. Friends accepted the report. @

201103.7 Other Concerns

- A. Pat Sewell suggested that IMM submit an application to participate in the Ithaca Festival Parade. The suggestion was referred to the Publicity Committee, with the understanding that any proposal made will be brought to the Monthly Meeting.
- B. Susan Wolf expressed the concern that cleaning products for the new meetinghouse will be scent-free and eco-friendly. Referred to Third Street Meetinghouse Committee.
- C. Marin Clarkberg noted that this may be the last Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business held in the Café at Anabel Taylor Hall.

At 2:45 PM, 20 Friends settled into worship before adjourning the Meeting. We will gather again for Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business on April 10, 2011.
