# Summer Sessions at Silver Bay

Dear friends:

This year was the forty-seventh time I've attended the NYYM Summer Sessions. My week at Silver Bay now is much different from when I was young – back then the week was all about making friends and playing games and swimming a lot. Now I'm on committees, facilitating interest groups, and actually love attending meeting for business every day. I didn't get near that beautiful lake till the day we left! But Summer Sessions is still about making friends, and there were 708 other Quakers there to get to know this year. And I was really pleased to see so many other members of Ithaca Monthly Meeting there to experience the friendships and community too (I just hope they had better luck getting in the water!). It was great seeing friends at this Quaker gathering that has always been so central in my life. Just so you know, this was the largest annual meeting we've ever had, with 528 adults, 73 young adults in the Circle of Young Friends, and 181 youth in the Junior Yearly Meeting. There was an amazing 126 first time attenders! And we had the best weather too – even the Emps (Silver Bay employees) commented on the wonderful sunny weather we brought with us. Normally we have several rip-snortin' thunder and lightening storms, some including hail, so seven days of sunshine was actually a little confusing! The only dark spot was a young man getting a serious head injury in a swimming accident, but just today I got the message that Franklin is home already, walking, talking, and expecting a 100% recovery. Welcome news.

It's hard for me to see Summer Sessions clearly, I love it all so, but I believe it was a caring, energetic, and faithful gathering. Our theme was "Stewardship; Our

Earth, Our Mind, Our Heart," and we had invited speakers from Quaker Earthcare Witness, Right Sharing of the World's Resources, and the Center for Theater of the Oppressed. We were challenged to live radically simple lives like John Woolman, consider diving into the Sabbath Aqueduct, and dance out our anger and fear. I wish I had the epistle already, because it does a wonderful job of summarizing our week, but one of the many pluses of being a recording clerk for NYYM is the fact that I have the minutes immediately at the end of the sessions, and I'd like to share a few snippets of them with you.

2007-07-22. The Clerk introduced Christopher Sammond (Bulls Head-Oswego), General Secretary of NYYM. .... [who] gave a message to the body about renewal, noting that the first renewal report was prepared 40 years ago. He affirmed that this renewal is present here in our annual session as well as working in the body of our yearly meeting, pointing as an example to the presence of 126 new attenders and many more young adults at Yearly Meeting this year. He cautioned against complacency and against the sense we are responsible for the renewal that we have sought so long and of which we are now seeing some signs. Rather we have responded to the Spirit, which is with us in our deep ache and hunger. As Goethe said, "What kind of a God would it be that only sought us from without?"

2007-07-48. Shirley Way (Central Finger Lakes) described her recent service in Colombia. ... In December 2006, Shirley traveled to Colombia with Christian Peacemaker Teams, and in June 2007, she spent six weeks in Colombia, facilitating eight Alternatives to Violence (AVP) work-

## In Remembrance: Hiroshima and Nagasaki, 1945

On August 6, 1945 at 8:15 AM, in Hiroshima, Japan, the first nuclear bomb was dropped.

On August 9, 1945 at 11:02 AM, in Nagasaki, Japan, the second nuclear bomb was dropped.

On Monday, August 6, 2007 at 8:15 am, there will be a one-hour silent vigil (rain or shine) at the Peace Pole in front of the Ithaca Friends Center/Burt House, 227 North Willard Way. This is a vigil of mindfulness and remembrance of the thousands of persons who were killed 62 years ago in Hiroshima at the instant of the blast, and of those who suffered and died from their injuries.

On Thursday, August 9 at 4:30 pm, the regular time of our weekly peace vigil, at the foot of State Street, our posters and peace messages will be in solemn remembrance of Nagasaki Day. Please plan to join us and add more voices to the message of peace.

We will not be overwhelmed. We hope that in remembering we will continue to seek global peace and justice.

## Women Swimmin' / fundraiser for Hospicare of Ithaca / Saturday, August 11

Yep, it's that time of the year again: could this really be the FOURTH year I will have jumped in Cayuga Lake with scores of women aged 18 to 80 to raise money for Hospicare, the hospice facility here in Ithaca?

Last year, 6 y.o. Thea got so swept away in my experience fundraising for Women Swimmin', she started her own fundraising effort: Shiny Clean, a cleaning service that gives all proceeds to charity. Her first check (\$100+) went to Hospicare, and they lauded her with a VIP tour and a lovely set of Hospicare notecards. Since then, she and her Shiny pals have raised over \$500 for various other causes: <http://clarkberg.org/wordpress/index.php?cat=6>

Hospicare is not a large facility -- I think they have fewer than ten beds. Last year, through this event they raised over \$152,000. That's got to make a significant impact in their ability to provide services to anyone with life threatening disease, regardless of their ability to pay.

This is just a groovy, wonderful event and I am so blessed to be a strong enough swimmer to be able to be a part of it. (The swim is about 1.2 miles in deep, open water. But note: It's not a race! It's a community event!)

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## Minutes of the July 2007 Meeting for Business of the Ithaca Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends

200707.1 Gathering:

The Ithaca Monthly Meeting (IMM) met on July 8, 2007, in Hector Meetinghouse for Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business. At 12:20 p.m., fifteen F/friends settled into worship. Our Clerk read the first eight queries from NYYM's Faith and Practice.

1. Are meetings for worship and business held in expectant waiting for divine guidance? Are we regular and punctual in attendance? Are we willing and faithful in the service of our meeting and in financial support of its activities?

2. Do we make opportunity in our daily lives for communion with God and the opening of our hearts to an awareness of the Christ Within? Are we thankful for each day as an opportunity for a new adventure of life with God

3. Are we careful that our ministry is under the leading of the Holy Spirit? Are we concerned to take time for the study of Scripture and other writings of spiritual value? Are we concerned for the spiritual growth of one another?

4. Are love and unity fostered among us? If differences arise, do we endeavor to reconcile them in a spirit of love and truth? Are we careful not to manipulate and exploit one another? Do we avoid tale bearing, and are we careful of the reputation of others?

5. Do we keep to moderation and simplicity in our daily lives? Have we allowed the acquisition of possessions to interfere with God's purpose for us? Are our homes places where the presence of God is felt by those who live there and those who visit there? Do we choose such recreations as are wholesome and consistent with Christian character? Are we careful in our choice of ways to use our time and energy?

6. Do our children receive the loving care of the meeting? Does the influence of the meeting promote their religious life and give them an understanding of the principles and practices of Friends? Do we offer our young people opportunities for fellowship, for service, for religious instruction, and for participation in the life of the meeting?

7. Do our vocations provide constructive and beneficial service? Do we observe integrity in our business transactions? Do we avoid involving ourselves beyond our ability to manage? Are we careful to conduct our affairs punctually, justly, and honorably? Do we avoid participation in lotteries, betting, and gambling?

8. Have we confronted our own decisions about our use of

alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs, and do we encourage others to do likewise? Have we considered the cost in human suffering that might result from such use?

There was no meeting for business in June, so the May minutes were read. Clerk reviewed the agenda for the day, noting that meeting for business is not only a time to making decisions, but a time to deepen our communication with one another. @

#### 200707.2 Spring Gathering Report:

Marilyn Ray reported that the Regional Treasurer made a specific request that Spring Gathering make as little profit as possible, and she noted the difficulties of honoring such a request. And in fact, we made a profit of approximately \$2000. This money will seed the next Spring Gathering and our Planning Committee will have suggestions for the next Planning Committee to help them avoid a profit. @

#### 200707.3 Children & the Life of the Meeting:

Marilyn reported that it turned out that it was not necessary for the committee to purchase a table for the new enclosure because Chuck Mohler kindly built and donated a table, which is working out well. @

#### 200707.4 Social Justice Committee:

Margaret McCasland reported on recent work of the committee, including volunteering at Kitchen Cupboard and providing transportation for family members to visit incarcerated relatives. Relating to earthcare, for instance, the committee wonders if the Meeting might consider creating a committee to address this spe-

shops for 103 participants....She described displacement from war and from unemployment, the drug trade, and governmental corruption. She said firmly, "We are funding this war." She expressed gratitude for the support of her faith community—Central Finger Lakes, Farmington-Scipio Region, the faithfulness group. "Without my faith community I cannot hear, I cannot follow."

Along with such moving reports, our Yearly Meeting approved creating a Committee on Conscientious Objection to Paying for War, and the related call to action; "New York Yearly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends invites all of our members to consider our minute of last year acknowledging that paying for war violates our conviction in the Power of the Living Spirit to give life, joy, peace and prosperity through love, integrity and compassionate justice among people. Friends now wishing to explore how conscience moves them with regard to the payment of war taxes are asked to prepare a Statement of Conscience...." We also approved continuing the General Secretary position with Christopher Sammond continuing in that position. The Earthcare Working Group brought forward, and the Meeting approved, an "Eco-Spirituality & Action Minute." The minute and action, too long to quote here, will come to each Monthly Meeting, and I hope IMM will take time to consider the minute and respond to the working group. Finally, we heard Frank Pineo's memorial minute and Ann's wonderful poem to her father. It was heart-warming to be there as Friends shared their memories of Frank and Thor.

I'll get the epistle and complete minutes to you as soon as I can. Till then, think good thoughts for Franklin, and good thoughts about attending the 2008 NYYM Summer Sessions!

cific concern, since there is much to learn and many actions which could be taken. The committee also asks, "In what ways can the Social Justice Committee be of service to the Meeting?" Friends offered their thoughts on these matters. Our clerk invited us to continue to share our thoughts with committee members. @

#### 200707.5 Report on IMM Summer Youth Camp:

Rini Clarkberg reported on the most recent camp. She noted first that the camp is not pulled together by a committee or officially recognize group, it is created by a resourceful and dedicated gathering of Friends. The camp is meant to be a four-day spiritual retreat for our youth—the goal being to create a loving community. Rini spoke to her personal experience of camp being affected partly by her being busy on Spring Gathering Planning Committee, but also by the Meeting's changing attitudes towards the land. She has lost some of her joy, as her optimism towards building a meeting-house on the land has waned. She asks, "What can the Meeting do to support this camp?" One suggestion is to bring the Annual Picnic back to the land, along with other activities. Another is a request for some investigation into gaining access to the land, even if only to update and distribute information which has already been gathered. @

#### 200707.6 Route 79 Property & Access:

Our Clerk noted that there would be little problem with looking into the question of access to the land, with no need for the approval of any expenses. The only questions are who should do the research and what work has already been done? The Meeting asks the Route 79 Property Committee to work on this question of options for access. The Meeting asks that the Property Committee review the work already done by the Design Committee and the Trustees, and continue that work with a specific eye towards facilitating the camp experience. We ask that the Route 79 Property Committee report back to Monthly Meeting at the next Meeting for Business. The committee will send out an email announcing its meeting time, so that interested persons may join the work. @

#### 200707.7 Treasurer's Report:

Steve Mohlke reported on May and June income and expenses. He noted especially that we will be sending \$440 for tornado relief to Kansas. Friends received the report.

Steve also distributed a letter summarizing his request to change the IMM scholarship process. Budget Committee has considered and approved this request. To summarize, presently all scholarship requests go directly to the treasurer, who approves them. There are various problems with this simple process, most especially the fact that one person should not have the sole responsibility for something so important. Steve suggests that Ministry and Oversight could have the responsibility instead, naming three persons from M&O to consider all such requests. This would be a small enough group that reticent people would not feel discouraged, and yet with the three named from three different years, there would be a continuing knowledge base in the committee and there would be more opportunity for the scholarship sub-committee to actually suggest scholarships to Quaker events, rather than just wait for requests. Our Clerk suggests that this proposal be referred to Ministry and Oversight for consideration. The Meeting APPROVED. @

#### 200707.8 Clerk's Report:

Our Clerk reported that we have received a request from NYYM for information for the upcoming Yearbook. He has been

in touch with people regarding the information needed, and in the process of filling it out, he has gotten a new look at all that the Meeting does.
